HISTORICAL NOTE:

The Applewhite-Douglas Collection contains primarily business papers of Sam P. Applewhite, Sr. and his employer, James S. Douglas. The material is about the creation and growth of the Douglas improvement Co. and how the creation of this business set off a chain of events that allowed for the birth and growth of the town of Douglas, Arizona, 1900-1955. Sam P. Applewhite and James S. Douglas became intimately involved in many other businesses that were a part of the town of Douglas, and by looking at their business correspondence one can get a glimpse of why the town of Douglas was the first mining town of its kind. It focused on the ideas of personal comforts and family environments infused with the grit and prosperity of the mining towns that had previously been the norm. This collection helps to show the journey of the town of Douglas and the two men who helped to establish it as the town we know it to be today.

James Stuart Douglas started his businesses in 1900 when he partnered up with several other men (W.H. Brophy, John Slaughter, M.J. Cunningham, S.W. French, S.W. Clawson, and C.L. Beckwith) and organized the International Land and Improvement Co. This would later be known as the Douglas Improvement Co. and Douglas Investment Co. and would set the building blocks for the town of Douglas to take form. The Douglas Family is represented in the collection by references and correspondence. James (Jimmy) S. Douglas' father, Dr. James S. Douglas (1837-1918) was born in Quebec, and became interested in mining, sparking his interest in coming to Arizona to look at mines for Phelps-Dodge. He served as president of Phelps-Dodge from 1908-1916. A man of great influence in Arizona mining, the town of Douglas was named for him.

In 1909 James S. Douglas' business had grown to a point where he hired Sam P. Applewhite Sr. as his private Secretary. The letters between the two of them tells us a great deal about the business habits of James S. Douglas, and of the work ethic of Sam P.

Applewhite Sr. Douglas wrote letters on what was at hand. He made stationary out of old envelopes that he had split open in order to write on the inside or using the empty space on hotel bills. Frequently he had to use hotel or steamship stationary as that tended to be one of the only things available to him at the time. Telegrams were exchanged constantly back and forth between the two men. Many of these telegrams were, in fact, in code. One can sometimes find a telegram with things scribbled on the side from one of the two men who were trying to decipher the code.

Sam P. Applewhite Sr. was born in San Antonio, Texas in 1877. He was the private secretary to James S. Douglas for 29 years (1909-1938). He had one son, Sam Applewhite Jr. who worked his way up in several bank and investment corporations until he became president of Production Credit Corporation in California. In December of 1938 James S. Douglas and most of the stockbrokers sold their stock of the Douglas Investment Company to Sam P. Applewhite Sr., wherein Sam P. Applewhite Sr. took over the company. He ran this company and the Applewhite Mortgage Company that he had started with his son Sam P. Applewhite Jr. in 1946 until he died in 1952. Upon his death in 1952, his son Sam P. Applewhite Jr. took over both the Douglas Investment Company and the Applewhite Mortgage Company. The bulk of Sam P. Applewhite Jr.'s papers in this collection pertain to the closing of the estate of his father and business correspondence with his old friends.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE:

To improve the condition and access to the collection, it was re-processed in 2015. Original order was unknown. This collection contains business correspondence, personal correspondence and paperwork concerning The Douglas Investment Company and its relation to the Town of Douglas. It also contains papers concerning the two primary men involved with the business, James S. Douglas and Sam P. Applewhite. The bulk of the business correspondence is between the two men along with some of their more prominent business partners. The correspondence is organized in chronological order starting in 1900. The financial and legal series is based entirely around the Douglas Investment Company and other companies involving James S. Douglas, and are organized alphabetically by business. The collection also contains information on the personal lives and family of Sam P. Applewhite Sr., Sam P. Applewhite Jr., and James S. Douglas. This collection is in fair-good condition, but some of the papers were not salvageable and had to be photocopied. Covers were removed from several ledgers due to water and mold damage.

The collection is organized into seven series: **Series I:** Sam Applewhite Sr.; **Series II:** Sam Applewhite Jr.; **Series III:** James S. Douglas; **Series IV:** Financial and Legal; **Series V:** Business Correspondence; **Series VI:** Maps; **Series VII:** Ledgers.
