**Arizona Historical Society** 1 **Annual Plenary Membership Meeting Minutes** 2 Saturday, November 2, 2013 3 Arizona History Museum, Tucson, Arizona 4 5 Call to Order 6 7 8 President Michael Urman called the meeting to order at 11:00 a.m., welcomed the membership 9 to the annual meeting and led the Pledge of Allegiance. 10 11 **Approval of Minutes** 12 Bill Porter moved approval of the November 3, 2012, annual meeting minutes as presented. 13 Prior seconded. Motion passed unanimously. 14 15 Call to the Public 16 17 President Urman made a call to the public. None was heard. 18 19 20 **President's Remarks** 21 President Urman commented on this era of declining resources of money, energy and help. For 22 AHS to be successful it needs the support of the membership. AHS is always working to do 23 more with less. In Flagstaff, the AHS-Northern Division operates the Riordan Mansion State 24 Historic Park with the help of volunteers and the Riordan Action Network support group. In 25 Yuma, the AHS-Rio Colorado Division is part of a multi-organizational effort with the Yuma 26 County Historical Society, City of Yuma, and Yuma Crossing National Heritage Area to create a 27 museum complex. The AHS-Southern Division in Tucson is keeping the Charles O. Brown 28 29 House open to the public by working with nonprofit tenants Ben's Bells, the Santa Cruz Heritage Area, and Borderlands, with plans for an additional tenant. There are many interesting things 30 going on statewide in which to be involved. President Urman remarked that AHS greatly 31 appreciates the support of its members. 32 33 **Executive Director's Remarks** 34 35 Dr. Anne Woosley said that although the mission of AHS is to collect and preserve Arizona 36 history, those efforts to collect and preserve have less meaning if there is no accessibility for the 37 public. People must have access to Arizona history to learn and explore the state - its traditions, 38 people and cultures - through AHS programs, using its libraries and archives, collections, 39 publications, and visiting AHS museums. 40 41 42 This year's list of activities, programs, and ongoing projects is long. Dr. Woosley provided a sampling. AHS will be the recipient of a collection of historical maps from the estate of Bob 43 Lennon, a mining engineer who had a passion for collecting maps. The collection will be a 44 significant resource for researchers. 45

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- Conservation of the AHS-Yuma archives continues and when completed, the archive will return 47
- to Yuma where public access will be available through an Intergovernmental Agreement with the 48
- Yuma County Library District. The AHS-Education Division continues to coordinate the 49
- 50 National History Day program, which involves thousands of students statewide. Under the
- direction of Dr. Bruce Dinges, Publications Division Director, AHS coordinates the Arizona 51
- History Convention. There are new exhibits in development that utilize the natural 52
- history/minerals collections, as well as an exhibit focused on the Medal of Honor and Arizona. 53
- 54 Outreach projects include the certified museum and small grants programs recently led by board
- member Ted Cunningham. 55

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- Historic cabins that otherwise would have been lost, are now located at the AHS Pioneer 57
- Museum in Flagstaff. The cabins, along with farming equipment, are used for interpretive 58
- 59 outdoor programming, providing insight to understanding Northern Arizona's past, how the
- people lived, and their challenges. This major project was made possible by staff and numerous 60
- volunteer hours. 61

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- AHS-Tucson received a Salvador Corona mural from a family intending to sell their home. They did not wish the mural to be lost but instead preserved and made available to the public. Salvador
- 64 Corona, a well-known Tucson artist, created whimsical murals installed in public buildings,
- 65
- homes, and decorative furniture. When the mural's conservation is completed, it will be 66
- displayed in a prominent museum location. 67

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- Dr. Woosley said AHS is undergoing the sunset review process for reauthorization as a state
- agency. Ten years is the longest renewal time that is granted under the Arizona constitution. 70
- She indicated that the process is most successful when Arizona legislators hear from the public 71
- in support of AHS. Dr. Woosley introduced Jim Norton, AHS Legislative Liaison. Mr. Norton 72
- offered an overview of the sunset review process and how members and friends of AHS can 73
- help. The AHS sunset reauthorization hearing with the Committee of Reference will be held on 74
- Monday, November 4, at 9:30 a.m. During the legislative session in 2014, a bill will be put 75
- forward to reauthorize AHS. 76

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- Dr. Woosley announced that Les Roe, AHS-Flagstaff Division Director, is relocating as Division
- Director at AHS-Tucson. The new division director for AHS-Flagstaff will be William Peterson. 79
- Dr. Peterson serves on the Council of the American Association for State and Local History and 80
- is the former CEO of the Deadwood Heritage Center. Dr. John Langellier, currently the 81
- Executive Director at Sharlot Hall in Prescott, has been appointed to serve as the new Division 82
- Director for the AHS-Tempe Division. Dr. Woosley said AHS is in the final stages of 83
- 84 interviewing the short list of candidates for the AHS-Yuma Division Director.

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## **Financial Report**

Bill Ponder, Chief Administrative Officer, provided the 2012-13 fiscal year budget report. He said AHS needs the continued financial support through membership, donations, program revenues, and the museum store sales. AHS revenues declined significantly from fiscal year 2011-12 to fiscal year 2012-13. Donations and earned income both decreased slightly as AHS came out of the funding efforts tied to the state's Centennial anniversary. However, these

decreases were offset by larger increases in grant funding. AHS expenditures saw the same dramatic decrease due to the Museum at Papago Park rent elimination. Salaries and benefits expenditures also decreased as a result of staffing vacancies. AHS continues to address rising utility costs by investing in its building maintenance systems. In spite of the challenges, resources were handled well and AHS revenues exceeded expenditures for fiscal year 2012-13.

## Report on the Arizona Historical Society, Inc. and Friends of *The Journal of Arizona History*

John Lacy, Governance Committee Chair, said AHS was established by an Act of the First Territorial Legislature on November 7, 1864. In 1884, the Pioneers' Historical Society was formed as a private, nonprofit entity. Over the years, the Society morphed into a state agency while retaining its nonprofit status, which has presented problems with fundraising; people ask why they should give money to the State when they already pay taxes. Mr. Lacy reported that AHS, Inc. was formed to create a fundraising mechanism for AHS. The Executive Committee of the Board of Directors serves as the directors of AHS, Inc., with the opportunity to appoint others to the board. As the fundraising arm of AHS, funds will be kept separate from state dollars. Mr. Lacy noted that another element of AHS, Inc. is to coordinate activities of the nonprofit groups who assist AHS museums and programs. Application for nonprofit status for AHS, Inc. is in the process of being completed.

Mr. Lacy said the Friends of *The Journal of Arizona History* was organized over six years ago in support of the AHS Publications Division. The bylaws require an annual report that is provided at this meeting. The current fund balance is \$25,540.81. At the last meeting, it was approved to expend \$3,500 for computer upgrades for the Publications Division.

Mr. Lacy commented that a major function of the AHS Publications Division is the coordination of the annual Arizona History Convention. The next conference will be held April 12-14, 2014, in Prescott, and everyone is invited to attend.

## Arizona State Board of Geographic Historic Names Report

Dr. Woosley provided the report on behalf of Col. Phil Hanson, AHS representative. She stated that Col. Hanson was reelected as vice-chair of the board. The Board approved naming a geographic feature on December 6, 2012, for a peak within the borders of the Organ Pipe Cactus National Monument in southwest Pima County, now officially known as Levy Peak. A 1939 Act of Congress documents Emanuel Levy's sale of the La Victoria mine to create the Organ Pipe Cactus National Monument. This document has the signatures of Emanuel Levy and President Franklin D. Roosevelt.
