MS 563 MORTON, CHARLES, 1846-1914 Papers, 1870-1963

DESCRIPTION

Personal and official correspondence between Morton, Emmet Crawford, Charles Gatewood and others from 1870-1909. Telegrams sent from the field 1883-1885, one manuscript entitled *Historical Sketch of the Third U. S. Cavalry* (38 p.) written by Morton in 1894 and a copy of a speech given by Morton in 1897 entitled *A Boy at Shiloh*. Also includes biographical information concerning Morton and Crawford, and information concerning a monument which Morton had placed on Crawford's grave.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

Charles Morton, army officer, was born in Ohio in 1846. He served with the 25th Missouri Infantry in the Civil War. From 1869-1899, he served with the 3rd Cavalry throughout the West, including posts at Ft. Union, New Mexico, Camp Verde, Fort Thomas, Fort Grant and Fort Apache, Arizona. He was promoted to captain at Fort Apache in 1883 and in 1885 moved with his regiment to Texas where he remained during the Geronimo campaign, except that in April 1886, he was detached to return to Arizona to accompany the remains of Capt. Emmet Crawford, 3rd Cavalry, who had been killed by Mexican irregulars in Sonora, to Nebraska. He became major of the 4th Cavalry, September 23, 1898, Lt. Col. of the 11th Cavalry in 1903. He became Brigadier General in 1907 and retired in 1910.

Emmet Crawford (1844-1886), army officer, was born in Philadelphia and served in the Civil War. He was commissioned in November 1864. In 1867, he was appointed second lieutenant of the 39th Infantry, and served in Texas before transferring to the 3rd Cavalry for duty in Arizona. In 1872, the regiment was sent to Nebraska for Sioux operations. In May 1882, he returned to Arizona and engaged in scouting operations. In September 1882, he was named military commander at San Carlos Apache Reservation and was assigned to enlist and train Apache scouts. On May 1, 1882, Crawford accompanied Crook on the pivotal expedition into the Sierra Madre in which they brought back nearly four hundred prisoners. As provost marshall at San Carlos, his job was to keep peace on the reservation. He was transferred to Texas, but returned to Arizona in 1885 when the Geronimo outbreak occurred, and led expeditions into Mexico. In January 1886, Crawford's camp was attacked by Mexican irregulars and Crawford was killed.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

This collection provides insight into the military presence and Apache wars in Arizona in the 1880s. The bulk of the correspondence was received by Morton from Emmet Crawford from 1882-1885 is descriptive of conditions at San Carlos. In addition, Crawford writes from scouting expeditions of efforts to bring the Chiricahuas onto the San Carlos reservation. The correspondence and telegrams describe scouting expeditions which Crawford undertook for Crook in searching for Geronimo. He describes scouting expeditions into Sonora.

One letter from Crawford in 1879, written from Camp Robinson, Nebraska, describes returning from Ft. Yuma and the conditions there. The manuscripts in the collection give a history of the 3rd Cavalry from the Civil War to 1894. The collection also includes correspondence after Crawford's death concerning Morton's efforts to bring his remains back to Nebraska and erect a monument there. Later, in 1908, Morton had Crawford's remains transferred to Arlington National Cemetery. The "Quartermaster Papers" include supply orders for Fort Thomas, Camp Verde, Camp Rawlins, Arizona, Territory, as well as Forts in Nebraska where the 3rd Cavalry was stationed.
