Special Issue: "Arizona since 1970"

Arizona historiography has traditionally focused on Arizona in the long nineteenth century, with the late Spanish colonial period, territorial era, and Progressive era being especially well covered by historians. By contrast, recent Arizona history—the period from 1970 to 2020—remains a wide-open field of study for historians. Yet, Arizona has changed dramatically since 1970, both at the local and state level but also its place within the United States, and historical studies of this period are needed. As such, the *Journal of Arizona History* invites proposals for article manuscripts for a special issue on Arizona since 1970, to be published in late 2027.

We would welcome proposals for scholarly articles about any aspect of Arizona history since 1970. We are particularly interested in proposals that focus on underrepresented communities. Manuscripts may employ a broad range of methodologies.

The *Journal of Arizona History* is a peer-reviewed, quarterly journal that publishes scholarly articles examining the history of Arizona. It is published in both print form and electronically on Project MUSE. Back issues are also archived on JSTOR.
